

The performance runs 60 minutes.



Gloria Bond Clunie is a founding member of the Playwriting Ensemble at Chicago's Regional Tony Award winning Victory Gardens Theater where her plays North Star, Living Green and Shoes premiered. She is also the founding Artistic Director of Evanston's Fleetwood-Jourdain Theatre where she directed scores of productions including Ain't Misbehavin', Ceremonies in Dark Old Men, Home and Raisin.

Ms. Clunie has been recognized for her work in theater and education by the NAACP, AKA and DST Sororities, American Alliance for Theatre and Education and the Vision Keepers. Awards include a Chicago Jeff, a Children's Theater Foundation of America Orlin Corey Medallion, a Scott McPherson, a Dramatists Guild Fellowship, Theodore Ward African-American Playwriting Prizes, New York's New Professional Theater Award, Chicago Black Theatre Alliance Awards, NEA and Illinois Arts Council Fellowships, the Evanston Mayor's Award for the Arts and most recently the 2018 YWCA YWomen Leadership Award.

Clunie adapted Giraffes Can't Dance the Musical from the book, Giraffes Can't Dance, by the British writer Giles Andreae and illustrator Guy Parker-Rees.

WORDS TO KNOW!

Listen for these words while watching the show!

djembe: a West African drum played with bare hands

savanna: an area of grassland with scattered bushes and trees, with both rainy and dry seasons, common in parts of Africa

clumsy: lacking skill or grace in movement

wondrous: extraordinarily good or great

hooves: hard coverings that protect the feet of many animals and allow them to walk for long distances on hard surfaces without damaging their toes

blue moon: an extra full moon in a calendar month or season, which only occurs every two to three years

acacia: a type of flat-topped tree common in the African savanna with leaves that giraffes like to eat!

drenched: thoroughly wet; soaked

garland: a rope of leaves or flowers or of other material

frazzled: extremely tired, nervous, or confused

rhythm: the pattern of long and short sounds as you move

through the song

ancestors: the people (or animals) from whom you are descended; people who were in someone's family in past times



DID YOU KNOW?

There are so many types of dance that look completely different from each other! Here are just a few special dances from around the world:

UYGHUR PLATE DANCE:

This impressive traditional dance from the Uyghur people in Northwest China includes balancing a stack of bowls on your head! *Watch it here and here.*

HEDAREB DANCES:

The Hedareb people of Eritrea have many impressive dance moves: one requiring incredible leg strength to make it look like they're sitting down when they're actually standing, and another involving holding a sword in your mouth! *Watch it here and here*.

HAKA:

A traditional Māori dance or challenge, Haka are often performed in groups and can demonstrate a tribe's power, pride, and solidarity. Actions include stomping, tongue protrusions, and rhythmic body slapping to accompany a loud chant! *Watch it here and here*.

DABKE:

An iconic folk dance from Palestine, Jordan, Lebanon, and Syria, the dabke (or dabkeh or dabka), involves stomping, jumping, and spinning in celebration! **Watch it here and here**.

DANZA DE TIJERAS:

The *Scissors Dance*, performed by the Quechua people indigenous to the Andes in South America, includes beautiful, brightly colored clothing and extremely difficult footwork! **Watch it** *here* and *here*.

DID YOU KNOW?

- **Giraffes** have the same number of bones (vertebrae) in their necks as humans! A human neck is likely to be just 4 inches long, while a giraffe's neck is 6 feet!
- Giraffes are called herbivores. That means they're vegetarians!
- Giraffes can be friends with other animals! At the Oakland, Zoo a giraffe and an antelope would spend time playing and lounging around together...instead of with members of their own species!
- **Crickets** are considered a delicious snack in many cultures across the world. (Do you think a cricket sounds yummy?)
- **Elephants** can communicate using sounds invisible to the human ear. They also have incredible hearing, and can hear other elephants from up to six miles away!
- Just like a house cat, lions can leap really high—sometimes as high as 36 feet in the air!
- One type of monkey, the White-faced Capuchin Monkey from Central America, says hello by sticking its finger up its friend's nose!
- **Zebras** are, in fact, black with white stripes. If you shaved a zebra, it would be almost completely black!




SIMILARITIES AND DIFFERENCES!



















CELEBRATE!



Use your favorite color to create a fantastical moon for the Blue Moon Ball!




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GET CREATIVE!

ACT!


Act out your favorite scenes from the play or book! What is a problem that the characters have in this play? How do they solve the problem? Could you recreate one of the scenes and act it out?
